ANNUAL REPORT OF PASTOR DAN BEATTIE


One of my favorite parts of the Bible is in Apostle Paul's first letter to the Church in Corinth. In Chapter 12 of 1st Corinthians, he tells Christian people how to properly understand the community of Jesus Believers and how each individual is to understand their relationship to the faith community. He says that the church, the community of Jesus Believers is a body. And just as a human body is one body, but has many (members) parts, so the Body of Believers is one body with many parts. This is a great analogy for helping us to understand where I see our congregation at the end of 2022.

If we think of OSLC as a body using Apostle Paul's Scriptural image of likening it to a human body then what follows is a timeline sketch of recent history. Since our goal is to have a healthy, functional, missional church body, we'll call it a medical history to take full advantage of Paul's imagery. In February 2020 OSLC like many other churches was put into a medically induced coma and life support systems engaged. In June of 2020 the patient/church was revived from the coma but remained hospitalized for the remainder of the year and well into 2021. During this time, the congregation/patient began resuming some normal activities with significant restrictions. Around Holy Week of 2021 the OSLC Body was released from the hospital and encouraged to resume all normal activities as tolerated (to use medical language) and physical therapy was prescribed since the body had been significantly weakened by the lengthy recovery process. The end of 2021 saw us celebrating Christmas in ways we were accustomed. We had completed physical therapy and ready to get on with our new life of recovery.

This brings us to 2022. This past year has been a year of strengthening the body – a year of getting back into shape. It has been a year of finally beginning to feel healthy (normal) again with an ongoing growth in that direction. Highlights for me have been: Six weddings. An enthusiastic response and attendance at a dramatic, theatrical, Good Friday worship followed by our second Easter Sunrise service. A confirmation class of 6 young people who wanted to include a seventh (a seventy something gentleman also wanting to make profession of faith that day). And this year a confirmation group of students totaling 16. Our VBS out pacing the previous year numerically and enthusiastically (likewise for Operation Christmas Child). Our first Motorcycle Sunday Funday wherein OSLC made connection with a new to us ministry - Beacon of Hope Men's Shelter in Fort Dodge. We had 15 motorcycles and one Jeep and twenty something participants with many folks joining in to collect and send much needed personal hygiene items. And to top it all off, this fall there have been a slew of baptisms.

In total, OSLC has baptized 21 people this year. Five of those were adults, one was a confirmation student, and the rest were little ones. This brings me back to where we started with 1 Corinthians 12. There is a key verse in chapter 12 that gives us keen insight into the way God works in and with a Church Body. According to verse 18, you can know/see/recognize that God is up to something, that he is working, that he is doing something, that he has an agenda afoot WHEN you see people (members/parts) being added to the Body. "GOD *arranges* the parts of the Body, just as he wants them to be (1 Cor 12:18)." In addition to the five adults being baptized, we have had twelve additional people added to the church by profession of faith. God, what are you doing? What are you up to? How do you want us to join into and participate in what YOU are doing? These are the right questions to ask every time one person is added to the body, and even more so when it keeps happening. Please join me in asking these critically important questions and seeking His answers in 2023. If we can clearly identify and articulate what God is doing in our midst and how he wants us to participate in His endeavors during this coming year; then, I believe we will be in a place to say at the end of 2023 - the patient (this Body of Jesus Believers) has become healthy, functional, and missional.

PRAYER MINISTRY

Peter wrote in his 2nd letter (4:7). The end of all things is near. Therefore, be alert and of sober mind so that you may pray!!!

Our prayer ministry goal - "being devoted to prayer" (Acts 2:42).

What does, being devoted to prayer, look like?

Here is one image: God's people are gathered in worship. God touches souls – often very deeply. God stirs souls during worship. After worship, this stirring is addressed, and spiritual power is released. God's people in need of prayer gather in a set aside place with set aside people. The concerns on their hearts are expressed to our loving Father. Wholeness, fullness, peacefulness is experienced and even healings happen.

When we don't know how to pray or what to pray, even a grunt or a sigh directed to the Lord will be taken up by The Holy Spirit who himself intercedes for us with The Father (Romans 8).

We have several small group Bible Study and fellowship opportunities at OSLC – Saturday and Tuesday mornings, 2nd and 4th Monday evenings. Small groups are great places to experience the power, nurture, and peace that comes to us from God in times of prayer.

The prayer principle in God's Word is very straight forward and not complicated. "Draw near to God and He will draw near to you (James 4:8)."

MISSION MINISTRY REPORT

Mission: What images does that word inspire? If you think in military terms, you think of operations, a mission objective. If you live in the South-West or are a history buff or like to watch old Westerns you think of a religious outpost manned by priests and nuns. If you are a movie buff, you may think of the Mission Impossible films, or the original TV series, or even The Blues Brothers, "on a mission from God." Or you may think of a church sending people to far away places on a 'mission trip.'

All of these images are helpful in shaping our thinking about mission ministry. You see, God teaches us in the Bible that every Jesus Believer is a missionary. And ministry is just another word for 'service.' Every disciple of Jesus is a missionary called to participate in ministry, in serving our Master:

He gives us **Mission Objectives**- for example, training our young people to walk in the way of Jesus, collecting and distributing needful items (blankets, food, eyeglasses cases, hygiene kits).

He shapes his people to be a **spiritual outpost** in the wild west. An even better image than 'outpost' would be an <u>OASIS</u>. An oasis is situated in a dry, dessert land. An oasis means life, refreshment. OSLC is created and called by God to be an oasis of the Kingdom of God in a dry and thirsty world. Jesus says, "come to me and drink, and streams of living water will flow from deep within the person who believes in me (John 7:37-38)." The life of Jesus in his people and the life of Jesus among his people brings hope and healing to broken people. Living water is meant to be shared by the church of Jesus Christ. Outside the church, outside the oasis is the dessert. And in the world, the dessert, there are mirages. Outside of Jesus we all are drawn to mirages that are full of nothing – empty promises of life leaving us stuffing our mouths with sand instead of life-giving water.

We are on a **mission from God**; 1) God is active. God saves us. The good news – the Kingdom of God has come in Jesus – is movement, a good news move – hope and healing in Jesus. 2) There is a distinct oasis community – a set of relationships – a way of life – an ever outward movement of generosity – fullness – peace – life. 3) An oasis is open on all sides. It is the opposite of a fortress. We do two things, we invite people into the oasis to drink and we carry water out to those who are thirsty 4) There is an enemy, there is also a dessert, there are mirages.

Everywhere we go is a mission trip, even an errand to the bank or post office.


Our prayers for 2023 – What next Lord? What are you up to Lord? How do you want us to participate in what you are doing? Shape us into an oasis. Show us how to partner in this oasis development.

We also want to help other ministries and organizations build an oasis in their dessert lands, especially those close to home, close to our oasis – Caring and Sharing, Quilting Ministry, Friendship Home and Children's Nest, Exira Care Center, Adopt a Family, Audubon County Jail and Audubon Fire Department, Beacon of Hope Shelter in Fort Dodge, Hope Ministries in Des Moines, Okoboji Bible Camp. Heartland District/Church Planting Task Force working in Lincoln NE, Surprise Church in North Dakota, Blessman Ministries International, Operation Christmas Child, Awaking Lives to World Mission, Faith Comes by Hearing, GoServe Global. Notice how these ministry partners start nearby and then move outward like expanding ripples on a still pond. This is Biblical. Jesus told the first disciples they would be expanding ripples as well, starting in Jerusalem, then Judea, then Samaria, then the ends of the world- Acts 1.

It is so joyful to be part of God's people where generosity prevails, where an oasis is established, where life giving water is so abundant it flows in streams out into the surrounding desserts.

One last thing to keep on our Radar: Where should we send our next missionary team? One of the Ministries listed above? There are many from which to choose. Maybe it could be something entirely new. If we seek the Lord, he will make it clear.

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION COMMITTEE

The Education Committee's highlights and challenges in 2022:

Our Sunday School curriculum in 2022 has changed to the Brite Curriculum which was created by Awanas. Our Confirmation students are also working through a new interactive curriculum with Pastor Dan called Head to the Heart.

Pastor Dan taught five weeks of Holy Communion classes for the 5th grade beginning February 20th-March 20th and their First Communion was April 3rd. The 6th graders received acolyte instructions that started on March 13th and they began their acolyting duties in May.

It was so great to be able to get to go to the Friendship Home again to sing to the residents during Palm Sunday.

Vacation Bible School this year was from Monday, July 18th- 21st for 3 year olds- 4th grade with the theme Monumental. We purchased all the supplies and decorations this year. Bible school was held in the evening from 5:00-8:00 p.m. We had daily lessons, music, and activities that reminded us to Celebrate God's greatness. The week ended with a program and slideshow for families to see what we had been doing all week. We again invited community members to attend and had another very successful and well run VBS with about 152 kids, helpers, and adults.

Rally Sunday this year was September 11th. We presented Pre-K students with their beginner bibles and third graders were presented their NIV bibles. We have worked with the Women of Faith to provide snacks for the Sunday School students.

Sunday School offering is supporting a good cause, helping our Compassion International children, and spreading the Good News of Jesus Christ! We continue to sponsor two children from Tanzania through Compassion International ministry - a girl, Grace, and a boy, Ibrahimu. We have sent letters to these children and are supporting them financially every month. We also have given monetary birthday and Christmas family gifts. They have written us back and drawn us pictures many times! It is our goal to keep the OSLC congregation informed and these children visible to them as well. This year we were able to adopt a family within our community from the Sunday School classes with their offering money. Council matched our offering up to \$400. Thank you for your continued support of donations of Sunday School offering.

The annual Sunday School Christmas program was December 18th. It is always so wonderful to see our Sunday School kids show us their musical talent and share the birth of Jesus through acting. We gave ornaments to the kids following the program. We took a two week Christmas break and resumed classes on January 8th, 2023.

We continue to sponsor 1-2 Family Nights a year. This year we offered Halloween pumpkin painting. The children come together for games, fun, snacks and fellowship. It has been wonderful for the kids to enjoy fellowship with all age groups of children, youth & adults. We are having discussions on how to grow our family ministry within our church.

The Rock Youth Ministry (7th-12th) continues with Junior High meeting the first or second Sunday of the month for supper/games/devotions (they enjoy supper with the High School students), and High School meeting on Sundays evenings. The Rock took the summer months off and resumed in the fall. The Rock attended Winter Jam in January and attended Ignite Youth Conference in March. Youth group is a time for the students to get together to play games, talk about challenges they are facing, and learn about how to keep God in their lives. This fall, several students started discussion and Fellowship of Christian Wheelers was started for High School students. They meet every Monday morning at school for devotion and prayer and they meet twice a month at the Rec. Center. This is bringing youth from many different churches together to grow in faith and have fellowship together. Local churches also joined together and had a first annual Reggie's Sleep Out in October, camping at the Wheeler stadium, and bringing awareness to the youth homeless problem in Iowa. We look forward to growing our youth program in 2023!

Plans for 2023 and upcoming challenges facing the Education Committee are:

- ~Inconsistent attendance (attendance is very inconsistent in several classes, so we are trying to do our best to combine classes/teachers but keep the curriculum still age based).
- ~Keep the Compassion Child ministry going and growing with SS offering.
- ~Holy Communion instruction for 5th grade offered in the Spring of 2023.
- ~6th grade acolyte instruction in the Spring of 2023.
- ~Prepare for VBS.
- ~Recruit SS teachers, VBS leaders, and new members for the Education Committee.
- ~Family Fun Night (coming up with new ideas to help get families active).

The Education Committee gained one new member this year. If you are interested in working in any way with the youth of OSLC, please talk to a committee member. We would like to offer our appreciation to our teachers, parent volunteers, and music leaders. The many activities of the Sunday School students would not be possible without the outstanding support of our volunteers. Thanks to a Memorial gift, we added a new to for our Jr. High Classroom. We look forward to working with the youth of Our Saviour's Lutheran Church and to a rewarding 2023.


